UNCLE VANYA

CAPTURED LIVE ON STAGE AT MOSCOW'S VAKHTANGOV THEATRE



SYNOPSIS

ACT I

As the play opens, Astrov, a doctor, and Marina, an elderly nanny, discuss how old Astrov has grown, the boredom which is his life. Vanya enters complaining about how all order has been disrupted since the professor and his wife, Elena, arrived. As they're talking, Serebryakov, Elena, Sonya, and Telegin return from a walk. Out of the professor's earshot, Vanya mocks him, noting his pomposity and the smallness of his achievements. Vanya's mother, Maria Vasilyevna, who idolizes Serebryakov, objects to her son's derogatory comments. Vanya also praises Elena for her beauty, arguing that faithfulness to an old man is an immoral waste of vitality. Astrov is forced to depart to attend to a patient, but not before delivering a speech on the preservation of the forests, a subject he's very passionate about. Vanya, likewise, expresses his passion, but for Elena, not nature.

Night. A storm. Serebryakov complains of being in pain and of old age. Astrov arrives, but the professor refuses to see him. After Serebryakov is mollified, Elena and Vanya talk. She speaks of the discord in the house, and Vanya speaks of dashed hopes. He feels he's



misspent his youth, and he associates his unrequited love for Elena with the devastation of his life. Elena will have none of it.

Astrov re-enters, somewhat drunk, and he and Vanya talk together. Sonya chides Vanya for his drinking, and responds pragmatically to his reflections on the futility of a wasted life, pointing out that only work is truly fulfilling. Astrov talks with Sonya about the suffocating atmosphere in the house; Serebryakov is difficult, he says, Vanya a hypochondriac, and Elena charming but idle. It's been a long time since he's loved anyone, he laments. Sonya begs Astrov to stop drinking, telling him it's unworthy of him to destroy himself. The two discuss love, during which it becomes clear that Sonya is in love with the doctor and that he's unaware of her feelings.

Elena enters and makes peace with Sonya after an apparently long period of mutual anger and antagonism. Trying to resolve their past difficulties, Elena reassures Sonya that she had strong feelings for her father when she married him, though the love proved false. The two women converse at cross purposes, with Elena confessing her unhappiness and Sonya gushing about the doctor's virtues. In a happy mood, Sonya leaves to ask the professor if Elena may play the piano. Sonya returns with his answer, "No."

ACT II

Vanya, Sonya, and Elena are in the living room, having been called there by Serebryakov. Sonya complains to Elena that she has loved Astrov for six years but that, because she is not beautiful, he doesn't notice her. Elena, despite suspecting the obvious answer, volunteers to question Astrov to find out whether there is a mutual attraction.

When Elena soon thereafter asks Astrov about his feelings for Sonya, he says he has none and concludes that Elena has broached the subject to encourage him to confess his own feelings for her. Vanya witnesses their embrace. Upset, Elena begs Vanya to use his influence to allow her and the professor to leave immediately. Before Serebryakov can make his announcement, Elena conveys to Sonya the message that Astrov doesn't love her.

Serebryakov's announcement consists of a proposal that he sell the estate, using the proceeds to invest in interest-bearing paper which will bring in a significantly higher income, leaving enough left over to buy a villa for himself and Elena in Finland. Composed but livid, Vanya asks where he, Sonya, and his mother will live. He protests that the estate rightly belongs to Sonya, and that Serebryakov has never appreciated his self-sacrifice in managing the property. Serebryakov insults Vanya, who storms out of the room. Elena begs to be taken away from the country and Sonya pleads with her father on Vanya's behalf. Vanya returns, wielding a loaded pistol. He fires at the professor, but pathetically misses.

A few hours later, Marina and Telegin discuss the planned departure of Serebryakov and Elena. Vanya and Astrov enter. Vanya has stolen a vial of Astrov's morphine, presumably to commit suicide; Sonya and Astrov beg him to return the narcotic, which he eventually does.

Elena and Serebryakov bid everyone farewell. In saying goodbye to Astrov, she admits to having been carried away by him, embraces him, and takes one of his pencils as a souvenir. Serebryakov and Vanya make their peace, agreeing all will be as it was before. Once the out



siders have all departed, Sonya and Vanya pay bills, Vanya complains of the heaviness of his heart, and Sonya, in response, speaks of living, working, and the rewards of the afterlife: "...Our life will grow peaceful, tender, sweet as a caress", she assures. "I believe it."


The film will run for 3 hours (Including a 15 minute intermission).

Liudmila Maksakova Voynitskaya Mariya Vasilyevna

Liudmilla Maksokova is the pride and glory of the Vakhtangov Theatre. Over her career she has worked with all the great directors of the Russian stage, including Ruben Simonov, Alex-Alexander Belinsky, Eimuntas Nekrosius, Pyotr Fomenko, and, of course, Rimas Tuminas. She is a National Artist of the Russian Federation, Laureate of the State Prize of Russia, and a Holder of the Order For Merit to the Fatherland.



Anna Dubrovskaya Elena Andreevna

Anna Dubrovskaya is equally at home in a variety of roles. Selected parts at the Vakhtangov Theatre include Zinaida Afanasievna in *Uncle's* Dream, Nina in Okayomovs' Lifetime and as Elena in Uncle Vanya. Outside of the Vakhtangov, Anna won two theater awards, the 'Seagull' and the 'Triumph' as Desdemona in *Othello*, and second 'Seagull' for the role of Beatrice in *Much* Ado About Nothing at the Malaya Bronnaya Theatre.



Vladimir Simonov Serebryakov Alexander Vladimirovich

In addition to the many characters he has reimagined at the Vakhtangov Theatre, Vladimir Simonov is equally renowned for roles he has played in other theaters in and around Moscow, with works at the Moscow Art Theatre, the Theatre of Nations, the Stanislavskiy Theatre, the Et Cetera Theatre among many others. Simonov is a highly sought after actor, equally adept at both comedy and high drama.




Artur Ivanov Astrov Mikhail Lvovich

Rimas Tuminas Director

In addition to his work on Uncle Vanya, Latenas has arranged memorable scores at the Vakhtangov Theatre for Eugene Onegin, Smile at us, O Lord, Masquerade, Storm, and more recently Oedipus the King.
